Kia ora koutou

The Council wishes to acknowledge the essential work that midwives continue to provide to wahine and their whanau in these challenging and uncertain times.

The Council reminds midwives that they should refer to the Ministry of Health website for practice information regarding COVID-19. It also recommends that midwives consider downloading the Awhina App so that they can be advised when updates are made to the information for health providers.

The Ministry has also advised that updated occupational health and safety advice for midwives has been provided and along with all other information can be found here.

At the recent Council meeting discussion was held regarding strategic projects including the Aotearoa Midwifery Project. The Council was also briefed on the review of the National Midwifery Exam and the work that is progressing on that.

The requirements of the overseas competence programme were discussed especially the need for internationally qualified midwives, including those educated in Australia, to prioritise completion of the cultural competence course in order to be able to practice in a culturally safe way in New Zealand.

A consequence of this discussion was that the Council amended its Internationally Qualified and TTMRA Registration policies making completion of the course mandatory before midwives will be granted their first APC.

The implications of this are that this group of midwives must complete the cultural competence course requirement before they are able to commence practice in any form in New Zealand. The course is available online and can be accessed internationally. Midwives must be registered in New Zealand however before they can be granted access.

Privacy Act


Changes to the Privacy Act are expected to occur in late 2020
